Practice orally responding, then write your ideas into complete sentences. Remember to hide the question words in your response.

HINT: Don't just give an answer, support it with reasons! Evidence can be implicit or explicit in the text, but may come from your experience as well. Remember a strong response cites more text evidence than personal experience.

Infer a Lesson

Explain a **lesson** that readers can learn from this story.

Include examples from the story and your own experience in your response.

Infer the main idea: What is the main idea or theme of the passage? Which supporting details told more about that main idea?"

Infer character traits: Identify a character. Now describe that character. What evidence in the text demonstrates that (those) character trait (s)?

Infer feelings: How does_____ feel? What evidence can you find in the book?

Draw conclusions to Predict: Make a prediction. What evidence do you have that leads you to that conclusion?

What's the author's purpose for this text? What evidence helped you decide?

Evaluate the character: Do you think he/she made the right choice? Why or why not? What would you do?

Evaluate text features: Were there any text features that helped you better understand what you read? What were they and how did they help you?

Evaluate: Could this story happen? What events helped you decide?

Assess: What would you change about this story and why? How would you change it?

Connect: Does this text make you think of another text? Describe the connections and give specific similarities.
